Message From the Chair

I am proud to share the Arca Actions & Achievements 2019 report. The service accomplished much in the last year. Host site BC Electronic Library Network and the Council of Prairie and Pacific University Libraries (COPPUL) entered into a new partnership that allows Arca sites to use WestVault, COPPUL's LOCKSS digital preservation service. New modules were created to improve the technical infrastructure; one notable module, called Islandora Remote Media, allows sites to catalogue, display, and stream files hosted elsewhere - from videos on YouTube and Vimeo, to audio in SoundCloud. And Arca welcomed six new partner organizations.

2019 Achievements

Developed Partnerships and Enhanced Arca's Customized Platform

- Finalized Letter of Agreement between the Council of Prairie and Pacific University Libraries (COPPUL) and BC ELN, allowing Arca sites to use WestVault, COPPUL's LOCKSS digital preservation service; registered Emily Carr University of Art + Design as the first Arca member to use WestVault under the new agreement
- Negotiated 2019/20 hosting storage and maintenance costs with SFU IT Cloud Hosting to secure sustainable storage pricing for Arca members
- Released the new Islandora Remote Media module, which allows a site to catalogue, display, and stream files hosted elsewhere — from videos on YouTube and Vimeo, to audio in SoundCloud

Expanded Membership Within and Beyond BC

- Brought six new partners into Arca: Athabasca University, Brandon University, Mount Royal University, Red Deer College, Vancouver Community College, and Vancouver Public Library
- Reached out to 18 previous recipients of BC History Digitization grants to assess interest in Arca hosting and support
- Held a facilitated session with the Arca Advisory Committee to determine Arca's long-term growth strategy; decision made to take a proactive approach to partnerships within the BC GLAM sector

Supported Knowledge Exchange and Communities of Practice

- Convened the Islandora Multi-Tenancy Interest Group and led the Islandora community in developing a framework to support multisites in Islandora 8
- Led a workshop on using Islandora as an Institutional Repository at the 2019 Islandora Conference in Vancouver
- Presented at Canadian Knowledge Research Network (CRKN) Access to Knowledge conference about Arca's adoption of Rights Statements and to encourage their use in Canada

Newman Western Canadian Cookbooks Collection

Exploring Cultural Trends through Local Cookbooks

Historians and anthropologists worldwide now have access to a unique view of evolving Western Canadian agricultural practices, gender roles, and societal values. The *Newman Western Canadian Cookbook Collection*, shared by the University of the Fraser Valley (UFV) Library via Arca, holds digitized cookbooks spanning 1913 to 1968. Compiled of cookbooks from communities and local restaurants and cafés in Canada’s western provinces, the Yukon, and Northwest Territories, the collection provides a distinct perspective of changing preferences and cultural values of the locale.

Named for the family of Dr. Lenore Newman, UFV’s Canada Research Chair in Food Security and the Environment, the collection was launched in 2014 as part of UFV’s Special Collections and now totals nearly 2,000 titles. The digitized versions in Arca are helping UFV preserve print copies in the collection and make the collection available worldwide.

Arca and the BC History Digitization Program

Leveraging Partnerships to Ensure Discoverable Content

An estimated 20% of pre-2016 British Columbia History Digitization Program (BCHDP) grant-funded materials are not available online and may be lost forever. With a goal of making those at-risk materials accessible to the public, BC ELN and Irving K. Barber Learning Centre (IKBLC) at the University of British Columbia Library partnered in 2017 to allow successful past and future BCHDP grant recipients the option of hosting their digitized material on Arca. Since 2017, ten GLAM (Galleries, Libraries, Archives, and Museums) sector organizations have joined Arca, and additional organizations are showing keen interest.

The Potters Guild of BC

Debra Sloan needed help finding a new home for a precious resource: 52 years of Potters Guild of BC newsletters tracing the evolution of ceramic practice in BC. Digitized with a BCHDP grant in 2011, they were housed in an increasingly unsustainable aging AtoM repository hosted by a commercial provider. As part of the IKBLC-funded partnership, the Arca Office had reached out to the Potters Guild as a former BCHDP grant recipient, and the email came at the perfect time. Within a few weeks, the newsletters were uploaded into the BCHDP Arca site, searchable and accessible in a stable, sustainable platform.

A Look Ahead to 2020

- Building and launching a new sandbox site that will provide an online space where administrators can test ingests, configurations, etc. in a site that looks and feels like the real Arca; space in the platform will be dedicated to the University of the Fraser Valley Library Technician program to use as an educational tool.
- Upgrading accessibility by working with CAPER-BC partners to implement improvements to accessibility within the Arca platform.
- Updating theming by collaborating with Arca Administrators on a theme update/refresh that may take the form of an update to the existing shared Arca theme, or a new theme that we will implement as an alternative option.
